I have greatly enjoyed both my time on the Committee and this last year as Chair - the friendship and support that I received from you all was truly remarkable and very touching. Thank you!



Training Hearing Dogs

A Hearing Dog supports and assists a deaf person in many ways. By wearing a uniform, they make an invisible disability, visible. They accompany the person at all times and give them confidence to get out and about and encourage interaction and communication. They can alert the person to a range of domestic and alarm sounds both inside and outside the home. They provide companionship and an antidote to the isolation that deaf people can experience, something some of us can identify with. HDDP (Hearing Dogs for Deaf People) have experienced an upsurge in the applications for Hearing Dogs.

Peter and I have been volunteers in training and socialising for almost 15 years. A succession of puppies and young dogs requires patience, planning, energy and imagination! (Just like being a teacher!)

All training is based on rewards, building confidence and making good choices, a dog is never asked to do anything it does not want to do. The process takes about 18 months and starts when the puppy arrives to live with us at 8 weeks old. We train the puppies to be good companions and progress through socialisation in many situations such as in shops, restaurants and on public transport, as Hearing Dogs must be friendly and impeccably behaved at all times. Later, we train them to recognise a range of sounds and to alert the deaf person in different ways.

The recipient of one of our trainees, Teddy, commented on the difference that he has made to her life.



"Since Teddy came into my life, he has changed my life and he has changed me. I no longer have to wait at the front door all day when I'm expecting a delivery because Teddy tells me when the doorbell rings. I no longer fear a repeat of the incident when I did not hear the fire alarm because Teddy tells me when a fire alarm goes off wherever I am. I no longer worry about not waking up in the morning

because Teddy will wake me. I no longer worry about burning the food or forgetting things because Teddy tells me when the kitchen timer goes off. I no longer have to worry about not hearing the smoke alarm at home because Teddy will alert me whether I'm asleep or awake. I no longer feel anxious when I'm out because Teddy is by my side and helps me... this bundle of fluff goes everywhere with me: to university, on trains, buses, the tube, taxis, shopping, restaurants, he

sleeps by my bed and follows me everywhere in the house. He is so loyal, loving and intelligent. He knows if I'm not feeling my best and makes me smile and laugh every day, I couldn't ask for better ears and will never be able to repay him in the same way he helps me. Thank you Teddy I love you."

One trainee, Harper was expected to fly regularly, so Peter and I made a 'mock up' situation so Harper could begin to get used to the experience of being on a plane. We gradually introduced experiences such as the noise of aircraft, climbing the steps, settling in the confined foot space, seeing and hearing the trolley and so on. In the event, she went to a recipient who worked for Guide Dogs for Blind People so she had to be an excellent ambassador for Hearing Dogs as well.



The puppies come from the Hearing Dog breeding scheme and are all breeds deemed to be most suitable for training, i.e. labradors, poodles, spaniels and the cockerpoo cross. All our work is closely monitored and supported by the charity which is based in Bielby near Pocklington and further information is available at https://www.hearingdogs.org.uk.

We have found volunteering to be very rewarding. We are part of a community, active, engaged, we feel valued and committed and have the opportunities to meet lovely people, including Princess Anne. We enjoy working with a variety of young dogs and there is always a challenge to be solved. We recommend volunteering and there are many opportunities to volunteer at HDDP in other ways, such as caring for the dogs short term while trainers or recipients are away, gardening, driving, maintenance, walking the dogs on site, etc. and support or interest is always welcome.

Running a Village Hall



Little Weighton Village Hall is used by three art classes, a choir, the Parish Council, the Gardeners' Club, craft classes, coffee morning, parties and occasional meetings of psychologists, psychics, cyclists, church and a gun club. There are many tasks: bookings, accounts, minutes, repairs, cleaning, gardening, renewal of consumables,

health and safety, publicity and entertainments.

As with all village halls, it is an uphill task getting young people involved in running it.

Users sometimes do not treat the hall as they would their own home – after one party, the Hall's metal cutlery was found in the bin alongside the disposable crockery. It wasn't that bad!

There is now lots of new stuff after a half a million pound refurbishment, thanks to the Big Lottery, which took 7 years of work by the committee. It is all worth it when you see small children arriving for a party who just love to run up and down in the big space or when you see lonely people having a chat at the coffee morning.
